# **FOREWORD**

The first picnic of the Leitch clan families was held in August 1926 on the Leitch homestead farm, being  $S\frac{1}{2}$  lot 2, con. 8, Mosa, the home of Alex M. and Catherine Leitch which was settled by Alex's parents Neil Leitch and Janet Munro in the year 1830.

The first picnic included only two branches of the clan, being that of Alex and Catherine Leitch and Mary and Malcolm Leitch. Several picnics were held annually to renew acquaintances and strengthen the ties of relationship with the younger generations.

Through the years the enthusiasm for some reason seemed to decline and a few years have passed without a Leitch picnic. It seems now we have entered a new era and requests are being made for a revival and also the compiling of a family tree.

This year, 1980, marks 150 years since Neil Leitch and Janet Munro and family of three daughters settled in Mosa. It also marks 161 years since Neil with his parents John Leitch and Flora Johnston and family (Neils brothers and sisters) came to Canada in 1819 landed at Port Glasgow and resided eleven years in Aldborough Township.

In accepting the responsibility of compiling a family tree of our great grandparents John and Flora Leitch, I did so with a great deal of hope that I would be able to call on many within the clan for help. It was gratifying the response I received to my request for information. To those who replied to my letters, to those who lent me material containing much data, and to those who expressed their interest in this family research, in their personal interviews with me I want to extend to them my sincere thanks for without their help my project would be impossible.

I am quite aware this family tree is not complete. There is no doubt some errors and omissions have occurred. We trust they can be filled in and that any errors will not offend anyone. We have tried, where possible to provide year of birth and death but not necessary month and day of same.

I am happy to report that two branches of John Leitch's family who had been lost to contact for some years, have been located and although we were not able to have those branches complete, we are glad to record a fairly good family tie.

I would like to give you a brief explanation on how we organized the generations in this book. I chose a method where we used margins. As the generations descend the margin on the page widens. It is my hope you will find this method easy to follow.

We used some abbreviations:

The year of birth is before the dash and the year of death is after the dash. Example (1903-1976)

Marriage is indicated by an "m".

Only direct descendants are capitalized.

I wish in closing to pay a special tribute to my brother-in-law, Eldridge D. Topliffe, for a very active and useful life. He being connected with so many organizations he was happiest when helping others that needed assistance of some sort.

It was so when requests were made for this history and family tree, he and his wife Elsie were the first to join in our research and endeavour to secure as much of the early history and genealogy as possible. I surely appreciated their help in getting this project started, but some months have passed since then and on May 5th, 1980, Toppy (as he was known) passed to his eternal reward, and how we missed his assistance.

Our appreciation to Bruce and Donna Leitch, the hosts for our 1980 reunion, especially to Donna who assisted me in many ways when I needed help.

# THE LEITCH CLAN

### What is in a Name??????

Sometimes we wonder where so many different names received their origin.

At present our main interest lies in one name, "Leitch". According to Dr. George Black, author of "The Surnames of Scotland", the name Leitch comes from the old English "Laece" meaning doctor. In the early days the name was spelled in various ways such as Leitch, Letch, Letche, Leiche and Leach. The Gaelic spelling was Macinleich or McInleich meaning the son of the Doctor.

In Dr. Isabel F. Grants book, "Lords of the Isles", she gives an account of this period of Scottish history. Clan Donald (The McDonalds) was Lord of the Isles during the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries. For a time it was the most powerful of the clans. Its territory included the western Islands and much of the western fringe of the mainland. Clans such as the McLeans, McKinnons, McLeods and MacPhees were its vassals.

Certain families of the clan seemed to have had a special skill or talent in caring for the sick and injured and thus they became hereditary physicians to the Lords of the Isles. They were given the opportunity of receiving the finest education obtainable at the time. They were sent abroad to study in Greece and Rome. These hereditary physicians included the Beatons, Macbeaths, (McBeths), Leitch (Leaches), and Macleans.

Some of the earliest Leitch families lived on the Island of Bute. John Leche was given a grant of these lands in 1429. Around 1466 Gilchrist Leiche Lord Kilmavaname granted to his son David this same property spoken of as the land of Kildavanan.

A few miles northward from the Isle of Bute lies the small village of Tavyvallich at the head of a beautiful bay on Lock Sween. This scenic area in North Knapdale was the area from which our forefathers came.

The earliest recorded forebearer family we have is Donald Leitch who first married Margaret Graham (my great, great grandparents), they had three sons and one daughter. Donald's wife died and he remarried to Mary Patterson. They had two sons and one daughter whose marriages will appear in the family tree later.

Donald, his wives and families lived in the North Knapdale area and as the family became adults they married, some establishing homes for themselves. The exceptions being John Leitch who married Flora Johnston (my great grandparents), together with his two half brothers Hugh and Alexander Leitch came to Canada in 1819.

As the Leitch's had no clan in Scotland but being a Sept of the McBeths and also a son of a Doctor to the McDonalds some claim is made to the McBeth tartan and also to the McDonald tartan. The Leitch coat of arms is beautiful when printed in colour.

Now that we have the information where the surname Leitch had its origin it is interesting to note how many other surnames were formed. Until about the year 1100 A.D. most people in Europe had only one name. (This is still true in some primitive countries today). As the population increased it became awkward to live in a village wherein perhaps one third of the population of males were named John, another size-

able percentage named William and so forth. To distinguish one John from another a second name was needed. There were four sources for these second names. They were a man's occupation, - a house builder, a grain grinder, food preparer, a suit maker Examples: Occupation - a house builder, a grain grinder, food preparer, a suit maker,

would be named respectively John Carpenter, John Miller, John Cook, John


Taylor.

Location - lived over the hill, John Overhill, lived beside the stream would be John Brook.

Parents - fathers name was William would be John Williamson or Jack would be Jackson or Johnston, etc.

Now we have learned how the various surnames had their origin it is natural for us to think that this not only true about our forefathers, but also true in respect to the many other new Canadians who migrated here from different countries in Europe. Their surnames surely had a special origin. It all adds up that many nationalities with a great variety of surnames make up the population of this great Dominion of Canada in which we live.

The history and family tree of this book begins with the Scotch ancestry of the Leitchs in Scotland followed by the descendants of John Leitch and Flora Johnston.

John Leitch, his wife and family of four sons and five daughters, natives of Achachosin, parish of North Knapdale Argyle-shire Scotland, left their homeland for Canada in the spring of the year 1819 (our records say "after potato planting time). They sailed from Crinan Scotland on the vessel "Harmony" and were nine weeks and three days making the voyage across the Atlantic, proceeding up the St. Lawrence to Montreal by boat and thence by ox-team and boat where possible the rest of their journey.

The wife and mother (Flora Johnston) died at Queenston Canada and is buried three miles from that place, through the kindness of a Mr. Rose, in his own graveyard.

The family kept going until they landed at Port Glasgow on Lake Erie. Here they decided to make for themselves a home in a new land. They settled on what was then known as Front Street (now #3 highway) in the Township of Aldborough on N.W. ¼ lot 17, Con. 13 in the year 1819, about five miles south of the town of West Lorne (near Eagle).

This land was acquired from the "Colonel Talbot Settlement". Colonel Talbot, an Irish nobleman was given a tract of land in Upper Canada (Ontario) to settle because of his service in the British army. He had hoped to build up a personal empire such as the nobles in Britain and Ireland had. The Colonel had advertised extensively in Scotland the terms offered to new settlers knowing the industrious natures and their superior strength and good health which made them suited for pioneer life and the rugged wilderness which Ontario was at that time.

For a certain number of acres on which the Colonel was able to establish permanent settlers, who were to improve their land. He received additional property for himself. The terms to the settlers were, they were to accept 50 acres of land from the Colonel, they were to clear and improve this 50 acres. When this was done to the Colonels specification they were to receive additional 50 or 100 acres according to the family status.

For eleven years they strived under pioneer difficulties to make for themselves a living. Because the soil in this township was a light sand they did not think it real productive, so in the year 1830 after hearing about an area in Mosa Twp. near Bear Creek (Sydenham River) they migrated here to what was known as the "Bear Creek Settlement", with only two or three houses between this area and the river St. Clair. Neil Leitch, settling on lot 2, con. 8, Mosa, was among the first settlers in this area, although the Munro and McLauglin families came to Mosa a year previous in 1829. It is not known definitely if John Leitch took up land in Mosa Township. The early census of Metcalfe Twp. shows the name of John Leitch registered with a son Hugh J. Leitch

on 200 acres, lot 22, con. 14 of that township and it is believed he had an interest in

that property. John is buried in Carwell Cemetery, Mosa Twp.

Our ancestors endured the hardships of pioneer life in a land of dense forest, without money or a place to spend it if they did have it. Our grandfather, Neil Leitch, had only twenty-five cents in his pocket when he landed in this country. Their first ambition was to clear a plot of ground where they could raise potatoes and corn, as this was their staff of life. Later as more ground was cleared they were able to raise some wheat but this had to be cut by hand with the sickle, then tied by hand with bands made with the straw. The next problem was to thresh the wheat. This was done by hand also with a "flail", which was made by tieing two round sticks of wood together with a leather or piece of rawhide lace, and then by a certain skill of wielding over the head and shoulders the grain was flailed from the straw. They invented a device to hammer the grain into meal by chopping a hole in the top of a stump. The wheat or corn was placed in the stump and pounded until fine enough for meal to make porridge. Corn meal was used extensively in those days by the early settlers and their families, from which they made their famous corn meal "Mush" and cakes.

Later as more ground was cleared more wheat was grown and this could be made into flour but the closest place to have their wheat milled was at Port Stanley, about fifty miles away. With no means of transportation available they would set out on foot and carry a bag of wheat all the way to Port Stanley, have their wheat made into flour then carry it home again. This trip, no doubt, would take days sometimes because there were no roads nor bridges, just a trail marked by axe blaze on the bark of the trees which told the traveller the best ground to travel. In later years a mill was built at Wardsville and was run by water power, from the river Thames.

As was mentioned before this area had a dense cover of very heavy timber. What a task it must have been to cut down those huge trees by hand with the axe. There was nothing they could do with all this fine timber but to let it dry and then burn it to get rid of it so they could get the land cleared to work. With the oxen the large logs were rolled into huge piles where they were later burned. The early settlers assisted one another and as more moved into the area they would in turn each have what they called a logging bee when everyone helped his neighbour. This was their neighbourly spirit

and the only way they could get along in those days.

In my research it was interesting to note that the pioneers that settled here brought with them their religion, their Bibles, their faith and trust in God, which they knew they would need to face pioneer life in a rugged country with its dense forest such as this was at that time.

Most of the early settlers in the Kilmartin area came from Argylshire and were Scotch Presbyterians, and soon after arrival met to worship in their homes and barns, until 1835, when a congregation was established and their first log church was built in the area of the present Kilmartin Cemetery. Later the second log church was built and in 1867 a brick church was built. In 1891 the present building was erected. Here a very active congregation meet every Sunday endeavouring to live up to the tradition of

their forefathers in presenting "The Word of God" in its truth and simplicity.

Many of the Leitchs were Presbyterians, but our grandparents John and Neil were covenant Baptist faith and worshiped in Ekfrid where this congregation still meet in a beautiful brick church on No. 2 highway. Some of the descendants of Neil Leitch joined with The Church of Christ (Disciples), a congregation founded by John and Archibald (Bear Creek) McKellar. This congregation worshipped in a frame church built on north half lot 1, con. 9, Mosa, the trend of the times when the young folks left the farms and the parents passed on to their reward. In 1945 the church ceased to function.

We cannot help admiring those grand old pioneer families who kept alive their faith in the Christian church.

In this new country such as it was at that time the people had to be self sustaining and had to know how to do things themselves. As the settlers increased in numbers

it was interesting to note how many of those people who came to this country had a trade of some kind. Our grandfather made all the shoes for the family and when the day came that they raised sheep (that was if they could save them from becoming prey for the wolves which were very plentiful in the woods), the women would card the wool by hand and spin it into yarn. Someone in the neighbourhood, a weaver by trade, would weave the yarn into cloth on a wooden loom which he probably made himself then it was ready to be made into clothing for the family. There were many others who were skilled in certain lines, such as some were experienced in making the dove-tailed corners on the log houses and stables they built; blacksmiths that made tools and equipment to work with; coopers that made barrels and tubs; carpenters and coffin makers, etc. So with the friendly spirit of good neighbours they were able to endure the hardships of pioneer life.

When our forefathers came here they were deprived of all conveniences and services that we deem necessary in our way of life. Their greatest problem was that they had no medical aid in this land of forest, so they had to depend on their own home remedies for all their ills. The Indian was an inhabitant here before the white man came, so as they made friends with the Indian they were able to get some of the medicine that the red man made from the roots and herbs of the forest. Many children died in infancy because of lack of medical assistance. Usually one certain woman in the neighbourhood was the "Mid-wife" who took charge at child birth. When epidemic hit, smallpox and diptheria were the dreaded diseases, as either were considered sure death in those days.

As the years rolled by those hardy settlers began to enjoy some easier methods of performing their work. For instance the cradle to cut the grain (which still had to be tied by hand), then came the reaper, a machine which was drawn by oxen and later by horses. It cut the grain and raked it off in sheaves but did not tie it. When the grain binder and the hay mowing machine came they really thought a lot of their hard work was made easy. The crosscut saw was a great help as it saved a lot of hard chopping with the axe. A store sprang up here and there along the stage route, which was the old Longwoods road (now #2 Highway). Wardsville was the nearest to this settlement, which was about fourteen miles and even at this date their only means of transportation was on foot. Wagonmaker made wagons which took the place of the old wooden sleigh for them. This and the ox-cart gave them their first means of travel convenience. There were no railroads until the Great Western was built in 1854. This railroad was later the Grand Trunk and now is known as the C.N.R. As stations were set up a few miles apart along the line stores and mills were built, and soon villages and small towns sprang up along the line. Such places as Glencoe, Appin, Newbury, Bothwell and many others gave them a means of obtaining their supplies at one of the nearest points. As many of the locomotives on the railroads burned wood for fuel this provided a place to dispose of some of their timber. As the country slowly progressed saw mills were built which sawed the timber into lumber, and this gave material with which many fine buildings were erected. Flour mills built and the product of this fertile soil was milled into flour to be made into food-stuffs for the then growing population.

As more land was cleared, although the log barns and stables built in the early days of the settlement served as storage for crops and livestock, it became apparent the day had come when more space was required to store the extra crops and livestock that each farm produced.

To meet this requirement, long straight trees were taken from the forest and made into square timbers. This was done by an experienced axe-man, who hewed the sides of the log to make a square timber, with a broad axe (an axe with a wide "bit" or "blade). The hewer took great pride in displaying his skills in making all four sides of the timber smooth without an axe mark.

Now the timber is ready, a framer is called to make the tenants mortises, and drill the hole for the wooden pins to hold the frame together. When the braces and rafters were cut all was ready for the "barn raising bee". At this time all the neighbours would turn out and with the strength of brawny muscles would put the timbers in place and raise them one bent at a time.

The exciting part of the event was, the men were chosen by two captains. The race was on in raising the last bent and placing wall and purlin plates on the posts and last of all put all rafters in place. The side that completed this first were winners. The frame up crew all enjoyed a sumptuous meal prepared by the ladies of the neighbourhood.

In the eighties and nineties many of the early settlers had passed on to their reward but a few still alive, along with their families witnessed the progress of time and were now beginning to enjoy the fruits of their labour. Roads and bridges were improved and new ones built. This was done by statute labour, a system whereby every property owner at an appointed time each year would turn out and assist in ditching and making a road to travel. When we see the thousands of miles of paved highways and our improved township roads, we would not be surprised if our forefathers would think it a great extravagence, which we look on as a necessity both for our existence and pleasure.

It has been a personal privilege and pleasure to me to relate in a condensed form at least a portion of the early history of the Leitch Clan and also to pay a tribute (which words cannot express) to those brave hardy pioneers who endured the hardships of the early settlers. They have left a heritage that we are blest with and which will be passed on to generations unborn. Do we ever stop to think what their sacrifices have brought us? The inheritance of the right to live in a democratic land of freedom where if within the laws of civilization of our country, we live where we please, vote as we please and worship as we please. What a heritage.

# Margaret Leitch and Jeremiah Gray Family

Margaret Leitch married Jeremiah Gray. They lived on lot 7, range 1, south of the Longwoods Road, Mosa (now #2 highway). This site is known as the "Battle Hill" farm and historically famous because of its connection with the war of 1812-1814 between the British and Americans.

To mark this site is a cairn erected by the historical society, which bears the following inscription:

#### **BATTLE HILL**

Here was fought the battle of the Longwoods on March 4th, 1814. United States troops were entrenched on this hill. The British losses were Captain D. Johnson and Lieutenant P. Graeme and twelve men of the Royal Scotts Light Company and the 89th Light Company killed, fifty two officers and men of these companies and the Loyal Kent Volunteers, wounded.

## Mary Leitch and Samuel McColl Family

Mary and Samuel McColl lived in Dunwich Twp. Elgin Co. near Cowal. They had a family of nine sons and two daughters. Some members of the McColls lived in Aldborough Twp. The Brock's Creek Cemetery is situated on the McColl farm. Many of the McColls are buried there. The McColls were of the Covenant Baptist faith and lived true to their belief and were highly esteemed citizens of their day. Their family follows.

# Neil Leitch and Janet Munro Family

Neil Leitch as a young man nineteen years of age came to Canada along with his parents, John Leitch and Flora Johnston and other members of his family in the year 1819. He was not old enough to take up land on arrival in Aldborough Township where they lived for eleven years. The father, John Leitch, took up a family farm being N.W. quarter of lot seventeen in the thirteenth concession of Aldborough. This land was acquired from the Col. Talbot settlement.

Neil Leitch married Janet Munro and in 1830 migrated to Mosa Township, Middlesex Co.

At this time the Township of Mosa was being surveyed into roads and farm lots by one by the name of Hugh Black who had as an assistant Peter McKellar (a relative) who had several relatives in Aldborough. On his return from time to time he would report that Mosa had fertile soil with good drainage and abundant water supply especially

along Bear Creek (now Sydenham River) and its tributaries.

The soil in that particular part of Aldborough Township was a light sand and thought not to productive as a clay loam such as the type Peter McKellar reported in Mosa.

The outcome was that many of the early pioneer families who first settled in Aldborough migrated to Mosa.

John Leitch and all his family relatives, along with the Munros, Bear Creek Mc-Kellars and other Scotch families came to Mosa. Neil Leitch with his wife and small children settled on Lot 2, Con. 8, Mosa in 1830. All the area then was a dense forest and we often wonder how a father and mother with three daughters, aged one to four, could survive the early years of settling in the forest. There were only two or three houses between Mosa and the river St. Clair at that time.

MARGARET LEITCH 1830-1921 was the daughter of Neil and Janet Munro Leitch of Lot 2, Con. 8 Mosa. She married John B. Munro 1830-1888. John was the son of Neil ''Ban'' Munro and Jennette Ferguson who settled on Lot 1, Con. 7, Mosa in 1830. Following the marriage of John B. and Margaret they resided on Lot 1, Con. 7, Mosa where they raised a family of six sons and four daughters as follows.

Following the death of his mother in 1851 and his father in 1874, John B. Munro purchased a home in Brooke Township in 1875 taking up 200 acres of wild land being Lot 2, Con. 9 on which he built a log house where he lived until his death. This area of the township was just being opened up at that time. The land had quite a cover of timber to clear and needed draining.

Neil Munro was the oldest son. He received a public school education in Mosa. When his father was stricken with a serious attack of rheumatism which confined him to his bed for thirteen years and surely hastened his death, Neil took charge of the home farm and with his brothers cleared the greater part of it. Neil owned the home farm until his death. He specialized in raising valuable Shorthorn cattle and registered Clydesdale horses.

The three brothers, Colin, Duncan and Archie lived on Lot 4, Con. 9 Brooke with sisters Mary and Sarah. They farmed 150 acres and like brother Neil raised registered Shorthorn cattle and registered Clydesdale prize winning horses. Archie entered municipal politics and served as councillor and Deputy Reeve of Brooke for many years.

This brings to a close the family history of John B. Munro and Margaret Leitch as from a family of six sons and four daughters there are no descendants.

Angus Ward reached the highest pinnacles in the diplomatic service of the United States, his adopted country. Angus Ward won wide recognition as a captive of the Chinese communists. He had been ambassador to Afghanistan and served in several other countries during his 31 years in the diplomatic service.

He reached prominence in the late 1940's when he and his wife Ingrad were imprisoned for thirteen months in the American Consolate at Mukden Manchuria, by the Chinese Reds. With diplomatic pressure so strong on the Reds they finally released the couple and put them on a boat to the Phillipines where they were met by the late General McArthur.

In January 1950 he came back to America. In 1955 he ended his diplomatic career after which Angus and Ingrad took up residence in Spain where they spent their years of retirement. Angus passed away in 1974 at the age of 81 years.

He loved to visit his cousins in the town of his birth, Alvinston, Ontario, and being a grandson of the late Isabella Leitch and Angus McLean he brought honour not only to his immediate relatives but also to scores within the Leitch clan.



## The Culver Family

The name of the Culver family is one of the best known among the pioneers of Norfolk county. Rev. Jabez Culver accompanied by eight of his thirteen children came from New Jersey to Norfolk in 1794 and is reported to have built the first log house in Windham township.

Other heads of Culver families also migrated from New Jersey to Norfolk. Joseph Culver is reported to be the ancestor of the Woodhouse Culvers who kept the pioneer Culver tavern "Poplar Inn" south of the town of Simcoe, a spot historically famous because of its link with the war of 1812.

Joseph and his wife Phoebe settled on the gore of Woodhouse in the late 1790's. They had three daughters, Nancy, Phoebe, Amy and one son William. William Culver married Catherine Fisher from New Jersey. Their eldest son Joseph married Jemima Backhouse. Joseph and Jemima had two children, Elizabeth Josie and Adam Culver.

Adam Culver married Nancy Leitch, who was born in Scotland in 1802. This marriage was the first link in the history of the Leitchs in Norfolk County. From this union came the Culvers, DeCoes and many descendants.

I with my sister, Elsie and her husband Eldridge Topliffe went on a trip to Norfolk county in July 1979 to see if we could locate some of the Culver DeCoe branch of the Leitch family tree with which we have had no contact for several years. We visited the Norfolk County Museum where we obtained much information. We were able to locate Mrs. Harold (Katie) Smith and her daughter Margaret Watters in the town of Port Dover. Here we received a great deal of the family data that follows.

After returning home we wrote to Mrs. Max Shaw, who lives near Simcoe. Mrs. Shaw was not home when we called at their home. I received a nice reply containing all the descendants of her parents.

On our return home we felt doubly repaid for a day well spent. We not only got a great deal of information which we were looking for but we got to visit with some of our relatives that we sometimes thought about but failed to contact.




